Hexagon Faux Succulent Planter

Supplies Needed:

Wood hexagon Faux succulents Floral foam or Stryofoam Burlap Glue Utility knife Ruler Pencil Scissors Scrap paper







Step One: Use the scrap paper to make a stencil for the foam. It's personal preference how much you'd like to fill the opening. We went for half full so that our flowers could grow on multiple planes.

Step Two: Trace the stencil onto the foam and carefully cut out with a utility knife. Take the time to test it in the wood hexagon and make sure you like the coverage and ensure that it fits.





Step Three: Wrap the foam with burlap covering one side and outer edges. The back side does NOT need to be covered. Use glue to keep in place. Once dry, glue the wrapped foam into the frame. The foam will hold the weight of the faux plants so make sure it is snug and secure!

Step Four: Time to start arranging! The plants will be simply inserted into place through the burlap into the foam. If it doesn't feel like a tight enough hold, you can reinforce with glue on the stem before inserting. *Tips: stems can be trimmed to make them more versatile and inserted flush. Artist's choice how densely your planter will be filled. Separate greenery to fill in gaps and try to create balance with your larger pieces. The flowers can help hold each other in place also.*

Personalization: Paint the back and/or sides of the hexagon for extra flare! Swap the flowers out for seasonally appropriate options to keep it to your theme. Put a hanger on the back as a wall piece, or lay on a table top for display.
