

### WAY SEEKS APPROVAL OF 1.5-MILL RENEWAL LEVY

Way Library will ask voters to approve a 1.5-mill renewal levy for operating funds at the polls in 2012. On October 4 Perrysburg City Council approved a resolution of necessity to move forward on our levy request.

If approved by the voters, the levy will provide \$922,699.32 annually for four years, providing approximately 49 percent of the library's income. The owner of a \$100,000 home will continue to pay \$46.00 per year. Property owners who qualify for a homestead exemption will pay \$34.00 per year. The library's current operating levy expires December 31, 2012.

The Way Library Board of Trustees studied the library's finances in light of an expected continued erosion in state funding. As recently as 2001, state support represented 93% of our budget. The library passed its first operating levy in 2004. During special meetings held this summer, the Trustees decided that by continuing to monitor expenditures and increase efficiency, the library could ask for a levy renewal, rather than an increase. The economy adversely affects everyone, and the library staff is especially cognizant of that fact, given the increased use of our services by patrons impacted by hardship and unemployment.

The levy is expected to be on the ballot in March or May—the presidential primary election. Watch for more information on the levy in future issues of this newsletter.

#### Historic Perrysburg and Way to present Civil War talk

In partnership with Historic Perrysburg, Way Library will join in marking the 150th anniversary of the American Civil War with a lecture on Sunday, December 4, beginning at 2 p.m.

Way local history librarian Richard Baranowski and historical researcher Tom Boltz will present a talk, "From Drummer Boy to General: Wood County's Role in the Civil War."

Mr. Boltz will cover county officers and enlisted men including forgotten local hero Colonel Arnold McMahan. A Defense Intelligence Agency analyst who returned to northwest Ohio with his wife Jean after retiring, Mr. Boltz received a master's degree in history from Bowling

Green State University. A member of the Wood County Civil War Sesquicentennial Committee, Mr. Boltz has lectured and written articles on Civil War history.

Mr. Baranowski will talk about little known General Patrick Slevin. Mr. Baranowski, with undergraduate and graduate degrees from the University of Toledo and Wayne State, has written numerous articles on local history and is well known for his series of videotaped interviews of both local residents and US military service veterans.
