On Saturday, September 11, public libraries across the nation will hold gatherings, discussions and forums which encourage people of all ages to think creatively about our country, our government and our media.

Dubbed "The September Project," the day is designed to encourage participation in our democracy. One of more than 250 participating institutions, Way Library is presenting programs from 9:30 a.m. until noon.

9:30-10 a.m: Coffee and refreshments. Register to vote, get an American flag and a copy of the Bill of Rights.

10 a.m.: For adults, a panel discussion, moderated by the LWVPA, on "How is Life Different Since September 11?" Panelists will

include Perrysburg Police Chief Rick Gilts and Sgt. Mark Wasylyshyn who along with Officer Jim Williams was sent to NYC for disaster relief; Dr. Walter Edinger, associate professor of clinical ethics at the Medical College of Ohio; Nancy Kelley, Way Library director; Mary Thom Williams, library board member and Reserve officer.

10 a.m.: Gerry Bazer on
American Presidents. In this election year, Mr. Bazer, retired dean of arts and sciences at Owens
Community College, will share presidential trivia and information in a special talk geared to upper elementary, junior high and high school students.

10 a.m.: Story Time/Crafts for K-4th graders, led by Robin Gillmore.

11 a.m.: Touring Washington, D.C. w/State Representative Bob Latta:
